



STARTING SCHOOL

Starting school is an exciting time of change for children. There is a great deal to get used to and some children will adapt more easily than others. School days can be tiring too, for children who are used to a rest during the day. Children often have to cope with new routines, bigger buildings, and more children who are older and bigger. There are different rules to get used to and many new things they are expected to do. Children need lots of support from you when starting school. There are things you can do to prepare your child for school and to support them in the first few weeks.

IS MY CHILD READY FOR SCHOOL?

WELCOME TO THE FIRST YEAR AT SCHOOL

At Gowrie Street Primary School we believe that the first year of primary school is THE most important year a child will have. This is because during this year they will learn the foundations of :-

- Making and keeping friends and working with others
- How to regulate their emotions in order to be able to learn
- The vital skills that will set them up for reading and writing
- Being independent and problem solving

Because we believe this, we have built our Foundation program to support all of these things.



TERM 1

Term 1 is a big term for our Foundation students. They are learning so many new things, the day is often longer than they are used to and it is usually the hottest part of the year also. With all this in mind, the first part of the term is a bit different. At Gowrie St we want to support our youngest students to have as much success as they can so that they love school. One way we do this is to shorten the week so they can rest. We do this by letting them have a rest on Fridays for the first five weeks of the term.

First day of school 2024 is Monday 30th January. Foundation students have Friday off until Week 5. They start a full week beginning Monday 4th March Foundation Assessments

On the Fridays students are not at school, Foundation teachers use this time to do Mathematics and English testing and to get to know students one-on-one. You will be contacted by one of our office staff to book in a time for your child to have these assessments done. It is absolutely vital that your child attend these appointments. It ensures that your child's learning is well-planned and that they are working at their point of need.

SCHOOL WIDE POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT

EXPECTATIONS

School-wide positive behaviour support (SWPBS) is a framework that brings together school communities to develop positive, safe, supportive learning cultures. At Gowrie St, SWPBS improves social, emotional, behavioural and academic outcomes for our students. Teachers and students focus on relationships and classroom instruction.


Students and teachers benefit from:

- increased respectful and positive behaviour
- increased time focused on instruction
- improved social-emotional wellbeing
- positive and respectful relationships among students and staff
- a predictable and safe learning environment

Every class in the school has weekly SWPBS lessons based on the need of the students and where they need extra learning about understanding our school-wide expectations. The expectations in the classroom are the same school-wide and this supports students to understand the appropriate way to be at school. In Foundation the expectations are presented in a simplified form. You will see the poster that is displayed in the Foundation learning space on the next page. Each of these expectations is taught and then students practice them, one at a time. The language of these expectations is used across the school and supports our calm learning environment. REWARD SYSTEM

At Gowrie St we use a reward system to support our SWPBS. When students display the expected behaviours they are rewarded with a token, told what the behaviour is that they have shown and how that links with our school values. This helps reinforce the message- good job for doing the right thing! Students collect these tokens and every few weeks are able to use them as 'money' in our SWPBS shop to purchase things like small toys, milkshakes, free time with a friend or even a class party if they save up enough.

GOWRIE STREET PRIMARY FOUNDATION LEARNING MODEL

At Gowrie Street we believe that the Foundation year is the most important year of a child's schooling. It sets up the mindsets for learning for the rest of a child's life. Young children all learn at a different rate and need time and space to master their learning. Learning in Foundation focuses on-



TALKING

Talking to learn is the first deep skill we work on with Foundation students. We teach students to use talk to tell stories, to make friends, to sing songs and use rhymes. We teach how to talk about our emotions and ask for what we need.


LISTENING

Listening to stories read to them improves students' vocabulary- a predictor of reading success. Listening to stories helps students understand how stories work and help them tell their own stories-predictors for writing success. Listening helps students hear the sounds in words which supports reading and spelling words for writing. Listening to others helps us make and keep friends and build empathy.

PLAYING




Play is the work of children. Children learn about and understand the world through play. At Gowrie St much of the learning our Foundations students do at the beginning of the year is through play. They learn important social skills, vocabulary, problem-solving and concentration through our 'play' centres. Play encourages curiosity and this is a key to learning success.




EMOTION REGULATION

Being able to know their emotions and how to manage them helps children concentrate on the hard work of learning. At Gowrie St we teach students how to do this using the Zones Of Regulation curriculum that helps children understand their emotions and teaches them strategies to help themself regulate.



READING AND WRITING

We teach phonics (learning that letters have sounds and blend together to make words) in a systematic and sequential way. Along with this, we run 'intensive' activities where students work at short, sharp 'intense' literacy tasks in order to make accelerated progress



UNDERSTANDING NUMBERS


At Gowrie St our Foundation students spend a lot of time using materials, their bodies and active learning to gain a deep understanding of numbers and how numbers work. Our students have a very positive mindset when it comes to maths!

GOWRIE STREET PRIMARY FOUNDATION LEARNING MODEL




PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Active, healthy kids are what we strive for at Gowrie St. Our students have PE lessons once a week, active teacher-led breaks throughout the day and are encouraged to run and play at recess times. We have fantastic grounds at Gowrie St that supports physcial activity.



THE ARTS

Creative learning is vital for young students. It encourages them to participate, share and develops thinking skills and curiosity. Our Foundation students have weekly visual arts, music and many opportunities to engage in craft across the week.



YORTA YORTA LANGUAGE

We are very lucky to be able to offer Yorta Yorta language and culutre. Our students are so lucky that they have a chance to learn the local langauge and spend time learning about the culture and traditions of the Yorta Yorta people.



PEER SUPPORT PROGRAM

At Gowrie St we believe that one of the best ways for children to learn is from other children.

In 2020 we introduced what is known as our Peer Support Program. This program has gone through a few changes but how it work is that one lesson a week our Peer Support Leaders (Grade 5-6 students) take a group of mixed grade children and they do some learning about making friends,



managing conflict and dealing with our emotions. This is done through stories and fun activities. In built is a chance for the big kids to teach the little kids something they are interested in or special skill. This program has really seen some terrific benefits and connects our students- especially our young students feel like they have 'big brothers and sisters' to go to if they need a helping hand.



WELLBEING TEAM

Our wellbeing team is there for everyone in our school community. We are there for students and provide them with help in time of challenge or if they need space and someone to talk to. We are also there for families and with the combined expertise of the team can support families with many of the challenges that we all can face at different times. ESSENTIAL GOWRIE ST KNOWLEDGE

HEALTH

During the first year at school, childhood infections are common. Infections spread quickly at school. If your child is sick or has been experiencing vomiting/diarrhea hours prior to school, they should be kept at home for at least 24 hours since the last episode.

Your child must be kept home if they are suffering from one of the infectious diseases identified by the Education Department. A separate listing of the relevant diseases is available at

HEAD LICE

Head Lice are common to all schools and do not indicate that the child's head is dirty. If you find any eggs or lice in your child's hair, please treat the lice immediately and let your class teacher know so we can inform other class members to be extra vigilant about checking.

ASTHMA, ALLERGIES AND ANAPHYLAXIS

If your child suffers from an allergy, anaphylaxis or asthma; please see the office for the required medical form to complete or check the website. An Action Plan MUST be filled out by your GP and given to the school along with any necessary medication from day one. The school must have direct access to any medicine your child needs.

IMMUNISATION DETAILS

It is mandatory for all enrolled students to provide the office with a record of their immunisation status certificate. Parents or guardians must provide an immunisation status certificate to the school regardless of whether the child is or is not immunised. The best place to find this is via the MyGov website or app

FIRST AID

Qualified first aid staff look after children injured at school and all accidents are recorded. If need be, you will be notified by phone of any first aid treatment. Please ensure that the school has up-to-date emergency contact telephone numbers at all times, especially after moving house, changing jobs or mobile phones.

ONLINE COMMUNICATION - COMPASS

Compass is an online system of communication that we use at Gowrie St. The website and app is used for the distribution of information and permission forms for excursions, incursions and other events. Each parent has an individual username and password to access Compass. Notification of new information or permission forms is sent via email or mobile notification. Student achievement reports are accessed through Compass via the 'View Academic Reports' link next to your child's profile photo. You will be provided your Compass login at the beginning of the year.

HOME READING

The Prep class teachers will explain the Home Reading Program in detail at the Parent Information Session. Readers will be sent home in the first few weeks of school along with sounds and words children are learning. Parents are encouraged to read every night to/with their child at first until students can read these independently. It is important to talk about the book before and after to encourage emergent comprehension skills.

PARENT VOLUNTEERS

Gowrie St has a strong belief in the partnership between the students, parents and teachers in the success of a child's educational outcomes. Parents can be involved in our school community in many ways. To work as a volunteer at Gowrie St School, all parents require a valid Working with Children Check (see the office for more information).

PERSONAL BELONGINGS

Children like to bring toys and other personal property to school for special occasions. Sometimes these things can give very young children a feeling of security and although we don't wish to discourage children bringing things to school, we expect that parents will keep a close eye on very precious things and perhaps not allow children to bring them to school. The Department of Education & Training has asked schools to advise parents that the school is not responsible for the loss of property brought to school by students and property is not insured.

LOST PROPERTY

If something belonging to your child is missing, please check in the classroom, their personal tub. Things may go missing for a few days, but if they are named clearly, they will likely return.

SAFETY


- The school makes a practice of teaching habits which ensure the safety and welfare of your child. We feel children are safer if their parents have taught them the following:
 - To use crossings where appropriate. To look both ways before crossing streets and to understand traffic lights and school crossings
- If riding scooters or bikes, children MUST wear a helmet. This is law in Victoria. If children do ride to school without a helmet, we will keep the bike here at school until a parent can collect it or a helmet is brought to the school
- Not to accept rides from, or talk to strangers. If you wish another parent to pick him/her up from school, you must let your child, and us know who this is
 - Not to leave the school ground without permission or an adult
- Toys and articles that cause or mimic injury must not be brought to school guns, arrows, slings, fireworks etc.
- Reinforce that sticks, stones, sand and tan bark must not be thrown (even though it may be fun!).

SUN SMART

Gowrie St is a SunSmart school. All children must have a broad-brimmed hat during Term 1 and Term 4 or they will need to stay in the shaded areas of the school. As this is not much fun for the kids or staff, please make sure your child has an approved hat-these are available through the office. The best place to keep the hat is in their classroom tub so that it does not get left at home. From September, Victoria's UV levels are on the rise, so it's time to dust off the sun protection gear and Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek, Slide whenever you are outside. Check the daily sun protection times – you can find them on the free SunSmart app, online (sunsmart.com.au), in the weather section of newspapers, or as a free SunSmart widget. If you can't check the sun protection times each day, make sure you use sun protection every day from <u>September to the end of April in Victoria</u>. Don't just wait for hot, sunny days.

- Help identify our students and promote our school in the wider community


KEY POINTS




Students aged 6-17 MUST be at school every day unless they have been exempt Schools **MUST** record student attendance twice daily Parents **MUST** let school know why a student is away School will contact you if you have not let us know why your student is away If your child is AWAY for 5 DAYS without a reasonable excuse, the school will contact you to have a **MEETING** to make a **PLAN** for how we can help your child be at school If the school can't contact you to have a meeting about attendance challenges, the school will refer the case to the **Department of Education Attendance Officer** and they will contact you.

WHY WE NEED TO BE -AT SCHOOL -ON TIME -EVERYDAY

- Students who come to school EVERY DAY make and KEEP friends
- Students who come to school EVERY DAY make PROGRESS in their LEARNING
- Students who are AWAY from school a lot make low or NO progress
- Any time AWAY from school means young students **STRUGGLE** to LEARN TO **READ**
- Students who fail to learn how to read effectively by GRADE THREE are at a MAJOR RISK of **NEVER** being able to catch up
- Students who are absent become **DISCONNECTED** from their peers and are at greater **RISK o**f suffering **MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES**
- At Gowrie St, teachers plan each day to build on the day before. Students that miss even a day are always a step **BEHIND**




